

SENIOR FINALS PREVIEW

THURSDAY 28TH NOVEMBER

Thursday afternoon sees the finals of both the U18 Stevenson Bowl and Cup competitions.

Firstly, the Bowl final gets underway between Foyle College and Dromore High School before Portadown College take on Royal School Armagh in the Cup final

All four school sides qualified for the game with wins in the semi-final fixtures just three weeks ago and now return to Havelock Park to compete for silverware.

Foyle College qualified for the Bowl final with an impressive 4-1 win against Lurgan College.

That day, goals from Emma Alford (2), Lucy Thompson and Ella McLaughlin sealed the win and booked their spot in the final.

They now face Dromore High School who reached the final with a narrow 2-1 win against Glenlola Collegiate.

After a quiet start to the fixture, Glenlola took the lead in the 22nd minute as Matilda Urry reacted quickest to a loose ball in the circle following a penalty corner.

However, despite a solid defensive display, the Bangor school couldn't hold on to their lead as Amber Murphy levelled with a reverse strike into the roof of the net before Holly Stewart got the game winning goal with just three minutes of play remaining.

Dromore Captain Cliona Cochrane says the side are 'very excited' to be playing in this years final.

"As a team we have worked very hard to get to this position and are very excited for the challenge we will face in the final. Reaching the final of the Stevenson Bowl is a huge accomplishment for us.

This is a true testament to the hard work, commitment, and dedication that we as a team have put into this season so far.



We look forward to the final and want to enjoy this day together as a team."

In the Stevenson Cup final old rivals Portadown College and Royal School Armagh go head-to-head once more.

The two school sides have met on a number of ocassions in recent seasons and meet for a third final in the last 12 months.

Both the previous two finals have been won by RSA with narrow victories in last season's Belfast Telegrpah Senior Cup and the Stevenson Cup.

Like the Bowl finalists, both sides qualified for this weeks final with wins at Havelock Park three weeks ago.

Portadown College booked their spot with a 2–1 win over Rainey Endowed.

Lucy Megaw opened the scoring after just four minutes as she reacted quickest to a save from Rainey goalkeeper Lola Henderson.

Just six minutes later the side were 2-0 ahead as Emily Adamson fired an effort from the top of the circle into the roof of the net and seemingly set her side on their way.

However, in the closing stages of the third quarter a late Rainey strike set up a nervy ending, but the side held out to progress.

Portadown College captain Rebekah Lennon says her side are looking forward to the final.

'I am so proud of how our squad have played to date and have prepared for tonight's final.

We are really looking forward to playing against RSA and relish the opportunity to face the current title holders in what should be a very competitive game.

We know the RSA girls well as a number of us play representative and club hockey together. Tonight, for a period of time, those friendships will be cast aside."

Team coach Beth Harper spoke of the hard work her side put in to reach this stage of the competition.

"We are very thankful and excited to have reached the final of the Stevenson Cup.

We have faced some exceptional opposition along the way and I have been so proud of the way that the girls have handled every task and challenge that they have faced to date.

They play with great composure, belief and teamwork and I am sure that this is why they have reached the final.

Their hard work on and off the pitch is paying off and we look forward to playing a familiar rival in RSA.

We expect a great contest and look forward to the challenge ahead"

They now face Royal School Armagh who reached the final with a victory over Methodist College Belfast with goals from Niamh Smith and Katie Herron.

The win not only cemented thier place in the final, but gives them the opportunity to defend their title and they have now reached this stage for a third consecutive season.



Coach Greg Thompson says the win has brought a 'buzz' to the school.

"It is a fantastic achievement by the girls to reach their third consecutive Stevenson Cup Final, following a competitive group that included BRA, Wallace HS and Sullivan Upper, followed by knock-out wins versus Banbridge Academy and Methody.

Mr Robert Stevenson MBE, affectionately known as 'Stevie', committed his life to sport and contributed much to hockey in Ulster and Ireland, over many decades.

He was an Honorary Life Member of the UWHU and of the UHU. He watched the Senior Schools Cup Final, later known as the Belfast Telegraph Girls Schools Cup Final for over 60 years. He decided that a runners up award was needed in the final and presented his Stevenson Shield, annually and as recently as March 2022. Stevie founded the U18 Girls Interprovincial tournaments with the aim of promoting Irish hockey and he attended these and Kate Russell tournaments annually, until the last few years.

His first love was always Cookstown High School, where he was a teacher of Physics and later the Vice-Principal. As a younger teacher, he was in charge of hockey in the school and later was committed to Girls' hockey by umpiring, timekeeping and supporting for over 32 years. Margaret Henderson, his colleague at Cookstown High School, said that "a lot of what we achieved was because of his pride in the school and his everlasting and constant encouragement". He drove pupils, teachers and parents all over Ireland, as well as transporting young players to Ulster and Irish training if they had no transport.

Stevie 's pride for the west of the province was evident when he created the West of Ulster League in 1964 to 'bring hockey to the west'. He never failed to be at the annual 1st XI final to proudly present the medals and his trophy to the finalists and winners.

Stevie was known in hockey circles throughout Ulster and Ireland. He will never be forgotten by those who knew and admired him for his dedication to hockey.
